- 1. The Disciples relate to Thomas their previous encounter with Jesus (which Thomas has missed, being absent), that they had "seen the Lord."
- II. Thomas responds by citing his conditions for believing, without which being fulfilled he will not believe:
  - A. He must see the nail marks in his hands.
  - B. He must put his finger where the nails were.
  - C. He must put his hand into his side.
- III. A week later the disciples are all gathered together, including Thomas.
  - A. Jesus <u>appears</u> in the same manner as in the last appearance:
    - 1. Jesus appears behind locked doors.
    - 2. Jesus comes and stands among them.
    - 3. Jesus says, "Peace be with you!"
  - B. Jesus <u>confronts</u> Thomas, apparently aware of his prior statement, and addresses his three criteria for believing:
    - 1. Jesus tells Thomas to *place*: "put your finger here."
    - 2. Jesus tells Thomas to see: "see my hands."
    - 3. Jesus tells Thomas to reach out: "put your hand into my side."
  - C. Jesus <u>exhorts</u> Thomas in light of his conditions having been fulfilled:
    - 1. Stop doubting.
    - 2. Start believing.
  - D. Thomas responds with a faith confession: "My Lord and My God!"
  - E. Jesus provides the meaning of his encounter with Thomas:
    - 1. Thomas has believed because he has seen.
    - 2. Those who have not seen and yet believed are blessed.

## IV. John connects this account with the purpose of his writing his gospel:

- A. Jesus did many more signs in the presence of his disciples than recorded here.
- B. What is recorded here has been written:
  - 1. That the reader might believe:
    - a. That Jesus is the Messiah.
    - b. That Jesus is the Son of God.
  - 2. That the reader, having believed, might experience life in his name.
